#### PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

On behalf of the Board of NEMATYC, I offer you a belated welcome back to another year of academic challenges and professional growth opportunities. This summer, like many of you, I attended some sessions designed to improve my pedagogical practices. When the date for the training sessions arrived, the day was one of the few uncharacteristically dry and balmy ones of this past season. I seriously questioned my sanity in sacrificing such a perfect golf day in the cause of professional development. "When", I asked myself, "would I ever be a finished product, if not now at my particularly ripe age?" "When would my need for training end and my pedagogical skills be finally honed?"

#### Message from Phil Mahler

#### **AMATYC President**

I write a President's column for the *AMATYC News*, and won't repeat any of that here. Instead I'd rather share some personal thoughts about AMATYC with my NEMATYC colleagues.

I am finishing my AMATYC Presidency at the Salt Lake City conference in November. I can tell you that the Presidency has been a lot of fun. It has taken me to conferences and workshops which I would never have otherwise attended, discussing technical mathematics, the MAA's American Mathematics Olympiad, reform of the math preparation of teachers, reform of the college algebra course, projects on a mentoring program for new TYC faculty (the MAA has an excellent one for four-year faculty called Project NeXT), revising the AMATYC "standards"... I have had the privilege of keynoting or speaking at several affiliate meetings, and attending the math Olympiad festivities in the State Department building in Washington. In fact I have probably made 20 trips to Washington DC in the last 2 years or so, as well as trips to Dallas (four or five times now), Cleveland, New York City several times, San Diego, New Orleans several times, Denver, Albuquerque, Boston, Providence, Cincinnati, Monterey, Burlington VT, Alexandria, VA, ... NC. That may be the complete list but it's hard to say. I've met many of the best and the brightest math educators at two year and four year institutions –

techniques. I hope that you will share some of your own experiences in the classroom with your colleagues from New England by submitting a presentation. Please consider some small way in which you can assist a colleague by permitting them an opportunity to rejoice with you on successful teaching moment or to lament with you over a classroom strategy that didn't work particularly well.

At our fall Board meeting, Roberta Kieronski, Past President of NEMATYC and current Nominating Committee Chair, revealed that many Board positions would be eligible for election in the spring of 2004 at the annual meeting. Among the positions available for the slate are: president, vice-president, secretary and member-at-large. If you are considering running for any of these positions and would like more information concerning the responsibilities involved in holding an office, please contact either Roberta Kieronski or me (see below). For those of you unfamiliar with the NEMATYC Board, the member-at-large position gives individuals an opportunity to observe the work of the Board at close range but with a low level of responsibility and commitment.

NEMATYC can only operate at its full potential with the commitment of members like you. Please don't assume that someone else will step up to the plate to pull together a presentation for the conference or to run for elected office.

Sixty-one sessions, 78 workshops and 7 mini-courses for a total of 146 educational opportunities will be offered during this three-day celebration. Five "centennial speakers" have been invited - for Thursday, Waldeck Mainville and Art Johnson; for Friday, Carol Greenes and Margaret Kenney and for Saturday, Father Stanley Bezuszka. The Balomenos Memorial Lecture will be given by Dr. Carol Findell from Boston University on Thursday from 4 to 5 pm. From 5 pm to 7 pm the Balomenos Reception is being held in two locations:

A) Expo Center For those of you who have never experienced a Family Math Night now is your chance. In the Exhibit Hall (Expo Center) there will be a working model of a Family Math Night. Come have some fun! You can try promiscuous problems from old textbooks. In 1900 to 1910 the authors were very creative. You might want to take the test given to potential teachers in New Hampshire back in 1903! There will be an exhibit of ATMNE history and a cash bar will be available from 5 until 7 pm. Prentice Hall has graciously sponsored the Hors d'oeuvres.

B) SEE Science Center Hot and cold hors d'oeuvres will be available. You will be able to explore theories of science ranging from bubble-making to space and momentum through more than 60 hands-on exhibits. See what the SEE Science Center can do for your classroom. Gift shop with inexpensive math/science related items will be open. On Friday there will be two special functions. In the morning a breakfast will be held with guest speaker Dale Seymour whose talk is titled "Bandwagons, Basics, Common Sense, and Tessellating Pancakes". Sessions and workshops will run from 9 am until 5 pm. In the evening, ATMNE's 100th Birthday Celebration and Banquet will include ATMNE history and entertainment by Len Cabral, Master Storyteller. There will be many things to do and learn during this three-day conference.





#### **Executive Meeting 6/20/03**

The Executive Committee received a detailed report on the 2003 Conference which netted the organization \$1,587. The Committee has made considerable efforts in its membership

drive. Letters to those who miss a conference asking for \$5 to sustain their membership have been fruitful. The Committee is continually reviewing and revising their policy manual so there is consistency and continuity within the organization. Bunker Hill CC's request to host the 2005 conference was approved with Southern NH University making a bid for 2006. Bonnie Wicklund, Ken Takvorian and Paul Laverty presented their preliminary plans for the 2004 Conference at Mount Wachusett CC in Gardner, MA. Our website is undergoing revisions.
