off to an awesome start. I have fantastic students. They are working hard and I am just trying to hold up my end of the bargain.

Speaking of holding up my end of the bargain, my theme for this semester is personal responsibility. Over winter break I did some soul-searching, and I feel like this is an area my classes have struggled with in recent semesters. What's worse, I feel like I've been accommodating and enabling this a bit more each semester as the job wears me down. This semester, I added a personal responsibility statement to my syllabus, and I'm making it a major focus in all of my classes.

for attending class, and paying attention during and participating in class. Outside of class, they are responsible for reading, doing their homework, and studying for exams. Much as I'd like to sometimes, I can't do these things for students. Nor can I force them to do them if they are unwilling, regardless of how much time and effort I put in. This is college, my students are adults, they make adult decisions, and need to live with the consequences.

I'm not student-bashing here. My experience is that when my students don't hold up their end of the bargain, as often as not they have very good reasons for not doing so. Working at a community college, my students have complicated lives, and life often gets in the way. I do my best not to make assumptions as to the cause or to otherwise judge them. That said, as students they do have responsibilities, and if they can't meet them, then there isn't much that I can do.

What are our responsibilities as faculty? I consider it my responsibility to provide clear, high-quality instruction and to assess students' understanding of the material fairly. When situations call for it, I am responsible for applying professional judgement based on my experience and the particulars of the situation. Over and above this, I feel that I have a responsibility to provide reasonable support to students who are interested in it, and to make sure that all students know that that support is available.

Outside of the classroom, I am a professional, and so I am responsible for doing those things that professionals do. I need to stay current in my field by reading appropriate material. I need to understand shifts, innovations, and initiatives in policy and practice. I need to attend professional development opportunities and professional conferences.

This, of course, is where NEMATYC comes in. Events like the Spring Conference and the Fall Dinner provide high quality professional development that allow us to meet our responsibilities as professionals. They give us the opportunity to meet with our colleagues and discuss what's happening in our profession. NEMATYC gives us the opportunity to sharpen our professional judgement. Our organization does all of this, and does so in a way that is fun and fresh every year.

Of course, if you are reading this, I imagine that you are well aware of the benefits of participation in NEMATYC. What I would ask everyone to do is to spread the word. The Spring Conference is coming up on April 3rd and 4th at Massasoit Community College in Brockton, MA. Please encourage your department members to attend and get involved. Imagine how much stronger NEMATYC be if we could all convince just one new personal from our departments to attend.



The NEMATYC STUDENT MATH LEAGUE RECOGNITION AWARD PROGRAM

Award Program

The purpose of the NEMATYC Student Mathematics League Recognition Awards Program is to foster extracurricular mathematics learning opportunities for students through participation in the AMATYC Student Mathematics League (SML). The top-placing student in the AMATYC SML Competition at each school in NEMATYC's region receives a \$100 award. The only criteria is the student must participate in both the Fall and Spring competitions. The top school receives the Lois A. Martin NEMATYC Student Mathematics League Award.

Highlights and History

Ten NEMATYC schools registered for round one in the Fall. Middlesex Community College had an excellent showing in round one and currently has the third highest score of all schools in the AMATYC Northeast Region with 105.5 points, and is first in the NEMATYC service area. Quincy College is currently ranked second in the NEMATYC service area.

NEMATYC schools had 11 of the top 20 individuals in the AMATYC Northeast region this fall. The highest individual score in NEMATYC's region is Gowtham Manickam of Middlesex, with a very impressive 25.5, which is third in the Northeast. Several other regional students were close behind.

The second test of the 2019-2020 competition will be given from Friday, February 21 through Saturday, March 14. If your college does not have a team, please consider joining the spirited rivalry among NEMATYC schools. Your involvement can be as simple as just administering the tests.
